What do teachers need retrieve from students before they start teaching new content ?	What specific ambitious knowledge do teachers need teach students in this sequence of learning? What are the signs of a healthy relationship?	<p>How do the media portray relationships? Stereotype - a widely held but fixed and oversimplified image or idea of a particular type of person or thing.</p> <p>Do you think that relationships on screen (TV, films etc) have changed over time?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • During the 1980s, the family unit was glorified, staying together as husband and wife was what it was all about. • Shows often symbolised that the wife and mother would be able to take good care of herself and her family. • The man would be supportive of his wife and took care of his kids. • Marriage was portrayed as being excellent and the pinnacle of a romantic relationship. <p>Compare what was on the previous slide about 80s TV relationships, to what you see in terms of relationships on screen now.</p> <p>Portrayal of relationships in the media are now more developed. They are more reflective of society as a whole, step families, LGBTQ+ relationships are seen more and more, which is a positive.</p> <p>Starter sentence ‘I believe that the media’s portrayal of relationships is negative. This is because relationships in the media are often extreme due to dramatic effect to make the show ‘more’ interesting. This doesn’t reflect a normal relationship, either romantic or friendship or familial based.</p> <p>However, some aspects of the media’s portrayal of relationships is quite positive. For example, understanding some of the issues regarding relationships in a visual manner helps people to spot the signs of abuse within relationships.</p> <p>Why can pornography be damaging to relationships?</p>
