The first 2 weeks of our return to school, following our most recent lock down, saw Meden successfully complete the mass COVID testing of all of our students. Once again, every year group, rose to this most recent of challenges and with positivity and maturity. All 3 tests for the students were completed within the 2 weeks allowing us to move to "Home Testing" in advance of the Easter Break. Nearly 3000 test were completed by students over the 2 week period, with every test having a negative result. Students took their tests home last week in order to test themselves in readiness for the final week of term. Completing the tests at home



remains so important to ensure, as much as possible, the ongoing COVID safety of our school community. Could I thank our parents and students for all of their support with this challenge. Without it none of this would be possible and, as we strive for a degree of normality in our lives, this testing helps us to creep ever closer to this. Further tests will be issued to students as and when we receive them from NHS Test and Trace.
