Work/skills/activities being covered in lesson leading to exams	<p>Week 1 (18th March) Exam question on the Interregnum period. <i>'The failure of parliaments between 1621-1653 owed more to the MPs than to the rulers.'</i> Assess the validity of this view. Students have completed an exam question plan for this question. The end of the Interregnum period.</p> <p>Week 2 (25th March) Charles and the nature of restored monarchy; rule through Parliament and Ministers, Clarendon, the CABAL and Danby. The emergence of court and country parties – change and continuity.</p> <p>Week 3 (14th April) Religious divisions and conflicts – Protestant dissent and conflict over Catholicism. Extract question page 177. <i>Extracts in relation to religious problems following the Restoration. Only look at 1 extract.</i> Exclusion Crisis and James II and his attempts at absolutism</p> <p>Week 4 (22nd April) Glorious Revolution and political divisions – Whigs v Tories. <i>To what extent was the power of the monarchy threatened in the years 160 to 1687?</i></p> <p>Week 5 (29th April) Religious changes under William III and government under William and Mary.</p> <p>Week 6 (7th May) Exam technique and last-minute revision. Students to bring numerous exam question plans to the lessons to go over them.</p>
Areas to revise as a priority leading to exams	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Split your revision into thematic study – religion, politics and finance. EARLY YEARS <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Religion in the early years' chapters 4, 7, 12 (inc. parts of chapter 5). • Politics in the early years' chapters 1, 2, 5, 6, 8, 9, 10, 12. • Finance in the early years' chapters 3, 8 (inc. parts of chapter 5). • INTERREGNUM PERIOD AND RESTORED MONARCHY <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Religion chapters 15, 19, 20, 21, 23. • Politics chapters 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 20, 21, 22, 24, 25. • Finance chapters 17, 20, 22, 24, 25. <p>Use these breakdowns to create spider diagrams or Cornell notes for each section (you will need to break down the politics sections into two further groupings). This will give you a thematic overview of the key themes.</p>

For example, if you were to pick chapter 2, create flash cards on the character of James I, character of Charles I, views on monarchy, the court of James I, the court of Charles I, the favourites of James I and the favourites of Charles I.
